

## Hospitality at National Liberation Heritage Site Mqhekezweni Great Place

It is our sincere hope that you keenly engage with our history, our culture and our people. The childhood home of Rolihlahla Mandela and His Royal Highness Chief Justice Dalindyebo, the son of Regent King David Dalindyebo, Aah Jongintaba!



Mqhekezweni Great Place provides accommodation and traditional food prepared by the community who live and work closely with the royal house. Each room can accommodate a minimum of two people sharing. Some of the rooms are offered in their traditional setup without modern furniture. Blankets can be provided to guests on request. Visitors who wish to occupy these historic lodgings, and are unfamiliar with sleeping on the floor with blankets only, are encouraged to bring sleeping or inflatable air beds to use during their stay.

Aerial View of the Mqhekezweni Great Place compound





From right to left, the modern house at the main gate entering the compound was built by the late Former President Nelson Rolihlahla Mandela. This is followed by the houses built by King Ngangelizwe Dalindyebo in the late 1800s. The two single rondavels in the background were built by Regent King Jongintaba.





The Amakwenknwe Room, was the room of HRH Chief Justice Dalindyebo Mtirara which he shared with Rolihlahla Mandela. It is rented in its traditional state (without modern day beds). The room has capacity to host up to 4 adults. Guests are encouraged to come with sleeping bags or inflatable air beds.






From right, the room with the blue door, was King Sabata Dalindyebo birth place, now named Hlangula due to his sacred and safe birth under the diligent courtesy of Regent King Jongintaba in 1928. The room comes with old and modern furniture pieces including a double bed, two single beds and a private adjacent room which can be used for bathing.

From left, UIndwendwe is the attached rondavel with the green door was King Ngangelizwe Qeya Dalindyebo's Guest Wing built in the 1800s. The room comes without any furniture.


